

TCPUD BOARD ADOPTS 2018 BUDGET AND NEW RATES

At the November 17, 2017 board meeting, the TCPUD Board of Directors unanimously approved the 2018 annual capital and operating budgets. The 2018 budget includes: a total operating budget for 2018 of \$12 million, a capital budget for new infrastructure projects of \$18.4 million, of which \$2.1 million is to come from

grant funding, and the District will pay debt service of \$532,351, leaving the District with \$1.4 million in debt service at the end of the year.

The Board also approved new water and sewer rates. Sewer rates were kept below the 2018 approved Proposition 218 level for the third year in a row. Water rates were adopted at the scheduled Proposition 218 level for the year 2018. The new rates go into effect January 2018. A typical existing residential customer will have a water base rate of \$70.25 per month, a \$4 per month increase. Monthly sewer rates for all customers will be \$42.92, a \$2.97 increase. These revenues will be used to cover operating and infrastructure improvement expenses for their respective services. More detailed information on the budget can be found in the annual budget book, which will be published on the TCPUD website in early 2018.

The Tahoe City Winter Sports Park is back for its second year offering ice skating, sledding and 4km of cross country skiing. The ice skating facility opened for the season on Thanksgiving

Ice skating season passes are only \$49 for adults age 13 and older and \$39 for kids 12 years and under. A full Park season pass is only \$95 for adults and \$65 for kids. Season passes can be purchased at the Park. If all season access isn't what you are looking for, day rates start at just \$5.

The Park's cross country ski trails are dog-friendly and are groomed daily for skate or traditional cross country skiing, there is also a snowshoe/walking loop (fat bikes allowed).
