LANDSCAPING WITH LESS

The TCPUD is beginning its first phase of installation of water meters. Now is the perfect time to think about water conservation, and one place to look is outside your house. Did you know that in California over half of residential water is used for watering landscaping and lawns? While it may not be that high at Tahoe, there are measures you can take to reduce your outdoor water use.

- **Time of Day** – Water lawns and gardens during early morning or late evening when temperatures and wind are lowest, reducing water loss from evaporation.
- **Maintain Sprinklers & Hoses** – Check your irrigation system regularly to be sure it is operating correctly. Broken sprinkler heads don't put water where it's needed and can waste hundreds of gallons. Make sure hoses are in good condition, a leaky hose can waste a lot of water.
- **Check Position of Sprinklers** – Be sure sprinklers are only watering your garden and lawn, not the sidewalk, driveway or your house!
- **Install a Micro/Drip Irrigation System** – These systems use low-water-volume irrigation components (under 20 gallons per hour), at low pressure (under 25 psi) to deliver a precise amount of water to the root zone of

plants. These systems can be tailored effectively to individual plant and garden needs. During even the most stringent water conservation measures, micro and drip irrigation systems can be used to water flowers, trees, shrubs and vegetables. - **Xeriscape** – To save the most water consider Xeriscape, conserving water through resourceful landscaping. You can reduce landscape water use by 60% or more by following these seven principals of Xeriscaping:

1. **Plan and design** for water conservation and beauty from the start.
2. **Create practical turf areas** of manageable sizes and appropriate grasses.
3. **Select low-water plants** and group plants of similar water needs together. Experiment to determine how much and how often to water. Consider using native species, as they require less water and maintenance.
4. **Use soil amendments** like compost or manure appropriate to the site and the type of plants used.
5. **Use mulches** such as woodchips, to reduce evaporation and keep soil cool.
6. **Irrigate efficiently** with properly designed systems (including hose-end equipment) and by applying the right amount of water at the right time.

New Water System Policies

The Tahoe City Public Utility District has adopted new water system policy procedures regarding private water companies within the Districts boundary. These deal with **Water System Acquisitions and Water Service Provided to Private Water Companies.**

- **Water System Acquisition Policy** provides steps to be taken when the District may be acquiring a new water system. Over the past 30 years TCPUD has acquired six private water systems including Quail Lake Water Company and Meeks Bay Vista Mutual Water. The old policy addressed one scenario for acquiring water systems, while the new policy addresses three different scenarios.

The first scenario is when a private water company lets the TCPUD know that they are interested in selling their system.

Second is when private water company customers are dissatisfied with their current water purveyor and request that their water system be taken over by the District.

The third scenario is when the District makes a determination that *public interest and necessity* dictate that it should begin proceedings to use eminent domain. Although condemnation is not something the TCPUD Board desires to do, it has adopted this policy so that there can be consistency and clarity in the process.

- **Water Service Provided to Private Water Companies.** This policy outlines specific steps for the District to consider in water sales to private companies.

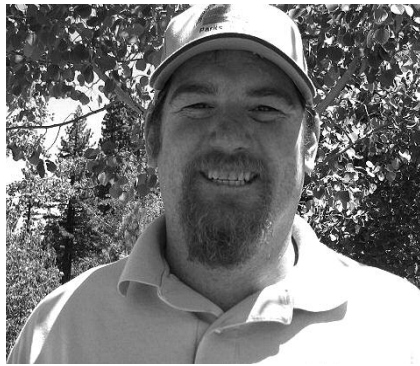
