
TCPUD BOARD ADOPTS 2020 BUDGET, SEWER AND WATER RATES

At the November 22, 2019 Board meeting, the TCPUD Board of Directors unanimously approved Resolution 19-27 Adopting the Operating, Non-Operating, Special Studies and Capital Budgets for 2020 - including a total operating expense budget of \$12.8 million, TCPUD funded capital budget of \$13.7 million, and non-operating expense and debt service payments of \$1.2 million. The TCPUD remains committed to its long-term objective of investing in its infrastructure and providing quality services to all its customers and visitors. A total of 43 water, sewer, and parks and recreation capital improvement projects are identified in the 2020 budget, and include the West Lake Tahoe Regional Water Treatment Plant, distribution improvements in the Timberland and Madden Creek Water System service areas, and rehabilitation of the Tahoe City Residential Sewer System. Additionally, improvements and upgrades will occur at TCPUD owned and/or operated facilities including, Commons Beach, Skylandia Beach, Kilner Park, Rideout

Community Center, and the Tahoe City Golf Course.

The 2020 TCPUD budget reflects new sewer and water rates adopted under Proposition 218 guidelines, in accordance with the 2019 Water and Sewer Rate Study. These rates continue to fully fund operations for both sewer and water. The rate revenue, along with property tax and grants, provide the critical funding that allows the TCPUD to undertake the 2020 planned capital improvement projects, and to continue the rehabilitation of the TCPUD's aging water and sewer infrastructure.

CAPITAL PROJECTS UPDATE

Dollar Edgewater & Glenridge Sewer Back-up Power Projects: Completed in December 2019, two capital infrastructure projects showcase TCPUD's improvements to sewer pump stations with limited storage capacity. The Dollar 1 Edgewater Backup Power Project will provide permanent backup power to the sewer pump station that serves lakefront sewer customers in Dollar Point. The Glenridge Sewer Pump Station Generator Building Project will provide permanent backup power to the sewer pump station serving sewer customers near Meeks Bay. Both Projects demonstrate TCPUD's commitment to maintain critical backup power equipment across our district and prepare for the threat from wildfire, extreme weather events, and public safety power shutoffs

Tahoe Cedars & Madden Creek Water System Master Plans: In August 2019, the TCPUD solicited written proposals for the development of Master Plans for the Tahoe Cedars and Madden Creek Water Systems. The Master Plans will focus on assessing overall system deficiencies and recommending improvements and associated capital infrastructure projects to bolster reliability within each water system. In November 2019, the contract for the Master Plans was awarded to Carollo Engineering and is planned for completion in fall 2020.

WATER WINTERIZATION TIPS

Winter weather is here! To protect your home and keep your water flowing, be water wise and winterize. The most important step is to use your stop and waste drain valve (if you have one) to drain your pipes anytime you leave for extended periods. Freezing water expands enough to break plastic, copper, and even steel pipes and can ruin tile and carpet, drywall, short electrical appliances, and destroy furniture. Here are a few winterization tips To view the full 2019 Multi-Use Trail Survey Summary Report, you can take to help prevent pipes from freezing:

- When unoccupied, shut off water to the house, drain all internal piping.
- Allow heat to reach plumbing, but do not solely rely on using a heater to keep pipes from freezing. Heaters can fail at any time, especially when it is extremely cold and they are constantly on, or when the power goes out.
- Insulate exposed water pipes under sinks, in attics, crawl spaces or outside house.
- Locate and stake water shut off box at the street. Stakes are available at the TCPUD.

If you do not have a way to shut off and drain the water from your house, please contact a licensed plumber to discuss your options.

WHAT IS A STOP AND WASTE DRAIN VALVE?

Have you ever wondered what a stop and waste drain valve is? Many homes have a stop and waste valve, or a stop and drain valve, as the main water shut off to their house. When turned off, these valves drain water from under a house to avoid frozen pipes. However, as the valves get older they become harder to operate. If they are not opened or closed completely, water will bleed out of the drain hole under pressure, creating a constant leak. The TCPUD has responded to leaks caused by this issue and found crawl



spaces completely flooded. To avoid wasting water, and possible damage to your property, the TCPUD recommends always properly and fully opening or closing these valves. If you have questions, please call the TCPUD at 530.580.6278.

2019 MULTI-USE TRAIL SYSTEM ANNUAL REPORT AVAILABLE

On August 7 and 8, 2019, trail user counts and intercept surveys were conducted by a team of TCPUD staff, partner agencies, and community volunteers at four locations within the TCPUD Multi-Use Trail System. A primary goal of the annual Trail Survey is to ensure the TCPUD adequately addresses and responds to improvement opportunities that further the public's enjoyment of the trail system. A few noteworthy highlights from the 2019 Multi-Use Trail Summary Report include:

• 91% of respondents claim the trails play a significant positive role in their enjoyment of North Lake Tahoe.

- 76% have, or would consider, using the trails in the winter. - TCPUD trail snow removal has expanded to over 10 miles this winter!
- 48% would have used a car for their trip had they not been using the trail.
- 11% were using Electric "E-bikes" which are allowed on the trails.
