



Youth Hockey Protection Plan

Facility Name: Tahoe City Winter Sports Park

The following measures were developed by the Tahoe City Public Utility District, utilizing guidelines from Placer County, the State of California, CA Department of Health, and the CDC and shall be implemented to protect employees, participants, and the general public from the potential transmission of COVID-19 at Youth Hockey Clinics. Parents/guardians will be informed about precautions and procedures to minimize the risk of COVID-19 exposure at Youth Hockey Clinics via email communication. The Protection Plan will also be available to the public on the TCPUD website.

Per CDPH, physical condition, practice, skill building, and outdoor training, with 6' physical distancing and within a stable cohort, is permitted regardless of county tier status. If a Regional Stay at Home Order is in effect, activities consistent with the previous statement are permitted, regardless of county tier status.

Signage

- Signage at the Winter Sports Park to inform parents and employees of the following:
 - Maintain a minimum of 6' distance from anyone who is not a household member;
 - Face mask or covering is required to be worn at the Winter Sports Park;
 - If you're feeling sick, stay home;
 - No congregating
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Measures to Protect Employee Health

- Everyone who can carry out their work duties from home has been directed to do so.
- All employees have been told not to come to work if sick.
- Symptom checks are being conducted before employees start work.
- Registrations will take place online and by phone only. No in person registrations will be available. To reduce administrative touchpoints on site, all applicable forms will be made available prior to the clinic start date in parent/guardian communications and on the TCPUD website.
- Health Checks: parents and/or caregivers will be required to complete a COVID-19 Questionnaire, a fillable form, prior to the clinic start date. This form can be submitted via email to limit administrative touchpoints onsite.

Parent/guardian will be asked the following questions at check-in. If the answer is yes to one or more, the camper will not be allowed to participate.

- Has the child taken fever reducing medication within the last 24 hours?
 - Has the child displayed symptoms or signs of illness within the last 24 hours, including fever, cough and difficulty in breathing?
 - Has the child or someone in their home had known exposure to a suspected or confirmed COVID-19 case?
- Hand sanitizer is available for staff and participant use.

- Disinfectant and related supplies are available to all employees at the following location(s): Club House, and recreation office.
- Hand sanitizer effective against COVID-19 is available to all employees at the following location(s): Club House, and recreation office.
- Soap and water are available to all employees at the following location(s): Inside Clubhouse.
- All staff are issued cloth face coverings. Face masks are required to be worn at all times.
- Staff will limit the amount of contact with parents during drop-off and pick-up.
- Staff will separate a sick child from others in a designated “sick area” that is separate from the rest of clinic and until the parent is notified and the child picked up by the parent.
- Staff training will include recognizing signs/symptoms, safety involving COVID-19, cleaning and safety protocol.
- Shared equipment and high touch surfaces will be disinfected at the end of each session.
- Copies of this Plan will be distributed to all employees.

Measures to Protect Clinic Participants

- Parent/guardian will be asked the following questions at check-in. If the answer is yes to one or more, the child will not be allowed to participate in the clinic.
 - Has the child taken fever reducing medication within the last 24 hours?
 - Has the child displayed symptoms or signs of illness within the last 24 hours, including fever, cough and difficulty in breathing?
 - Has the child or someone in their home had known exposure to a suspected or confirmed COVID-19 case?
- Clinics will be held entirely outside.
- Participants are required to bring their own face covering, per CA Department of Health mandate. Staff will supply face coverings to participants as needed or if a participant misplaces their own during camp.
- Clinic sizes will be limited to meet capacity guidelines.
- Clinic participants will maintain consistent staff assignment.
- Staff will review safety rules with clinic participants on the first day, including social distancing considerations, coughing and sneezing safety, when to stay home, and hand washing/sanitizing.
- Staff will reinforce, teach and practice healthy hygiene with the clinic participants including hand after bathroom use.
- Staff will practice maintaining at least 6’ distance by the clinic participants as much as possible.
- Personal belongings should not be shared, including equipment or water bottles. Rental equipment is available and will be cleaned and disinfected before use by another person.
- Staff will separate a sick child from others in a designated “sick area” that is outside and separate from the clinic location. Staff will refer to the “Plan for when a Staff Member or Camper Becomes Sick” section for next steps after a sick child is identified.
- Information and instructions will be available on our web page and in parent communications to educate clinic participants and parent/guardians to our guidelines.

Plan for when a Staff Member or Clinic Participant Becomes Sick

- Any participant exhibiting symptoms will be separated immediately to a sick area to wait in isolation until they can be picked up by a parent/guardian. Any staff exhibiting symptoms will follow established District protocol. Staff must wear PPE (face covering, disposable gloves, and eye protection) when coming into close proximity of the sick child.
 - Staff will notify local health officials, necessary staff, and all families immediately of any positive case of COVID-19 while maintaining confidentiality.
 - Staff will advise sick staff or participants, who know they had COVID-19 and had symptoms, not to return until they have met the CDC criteria to discontinue home isolation. In the case of a positive test and no symptoms, staff or participant can return once CDC guidelines are met.
 - Supervising staff will clean and disinfect or dispose of items used in sick area.
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Measures to Increase Sanitization

- Disinfecting all equipment used during the day.
- Disinfecting high touch surfaces frequently.
